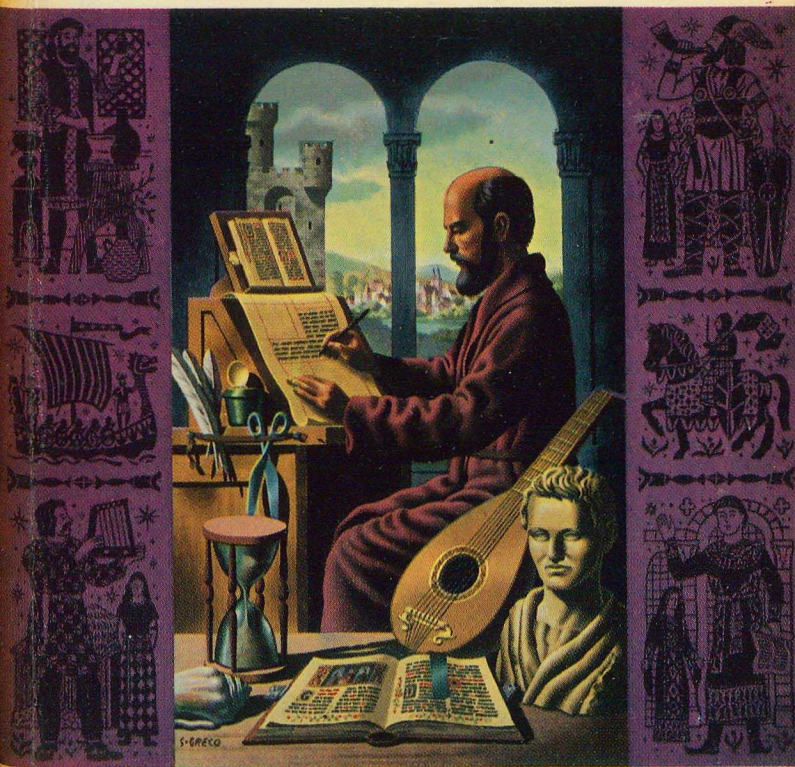

W. P. Ker, the great authority on medieval literature, explores history, heroic tales, philosophy, romances, poetry and mythology—including the works of Bede, St. Gregory, Boethius, Cynewulf, Roland—in this illuminating picture of the Dark Ages. The result is a comprehensive and colorful analysis of a creative age that was to influence all succeeding literature.

W. P. Ker was a singularly inspiring teacher and a scholar of wide and humane sympathies. A British man of letters, he was born at Glasgow on August 30, 1855, studied at Glasgow university and Balliol college, Oxford, and taught English literature at University college, London until his death in 1922.
